Reading Words (A)

- 1. I can use my knowledge of roots words, prefixes and suffixes to read and understand new words I meet.
- 2. I pay close attention to new vocabulary and seek the meaning of unknown words.
- 3. I can read aloud, taking in to account all punctuation and author intentions.
- 4. I can prepare and perform a wide range of stories, poems and non-fiction texts.

Group Participation and Leadership (B)

- 1. I can lead and participate in a wide range of book talk, building on my own ideas and challenging others politely.
